Chronology

Baring-Gould places the story at Wednesday, September 12, 1888 which makes it 18th of the 60. This means that Holmes is 34 and Watson 36.

This case is one of 23 classified as a MURDER where the perpetrator Holmes solved the case but one of 5 where the perpetrator escaped justice. The others were FIVE, MUSG, RESI, and WIST.

The Best Of Sherlock Holmes

- 1927 Arthur Conan Doyle did not include it on his list of 12 favorites.
- 1959 The Baker Street Irregulars did not list it on their top 10.
- 1999 The Baker Street Irregulars voted it 22nd of the 56 short stories.
- 1999 The Sherlock Holmes Society of London voted it 25th of the 56 short stories.

What Else Happened That Year (1888)

- Mashonaland and Matabeleland declared British sphere of influence.
- British East Africa Company founded.
- Jack the Ripper has murder spree in Whitechapel.
- Miners Federation of Great Britain formed; demand for minimum wage.
- Foundation of Scottish Labour Party.
- English Priory of Knights Hospitalers authorized by Royal Charter.
- Foundation of London General Omnibus Company.
- French Indochina formed.
- Slavery ends in Brazil.
- Emperor Wilhelm I of Germany dies; Frederick III becomes Emperor from March to June, dies, and is succeeded by Wilhelm II.
- Benjamin Harrison elected President of United States; even though Cleveland received more popular votes, the electoral college gives the election to Harrison.
- New York State establishes electric chair for method of death penalty.
- Oscar Wilde publishes The Happy Prince and Other Tales.

- Mycroft, Sherlock's older brother
- Mr. Meles, the interpreter
- Harold Latimer, beguiled Sophy
- Wilson Kemp, Latimer's coconspirator.
- Paul Kratides, captive of Latimer and Kemp.
- Sophy Kratides, his sister.
- J. Davenport knew Sophy before the conspiracy thickened. He answered Mycroft's ad.

Quotable Sherlock

• "My ancestors were country squires, who appear to have led much the same life as is natural to their class.

But, none the less, my turn that way is in my veins, and may have come with my grandmother who was the sister of Vernet, the French artist."

- "Art in the blood is liable to take the strangest forms."
- "My dear Watson," said he, "I cannot agree with those who rank modesty among the virtues. To the logician all things should be seen exactly as they are, and to underestimate one's self is as much a departure from truth as to exaggerate one's own powers."
- "The Diogenes Club is the queerest club in London, and Mycroft one of the queerest men."
- "There are many men in London, you know, who, some from shyness, some from misanthropy, have no wish for the company of their fellows. Yet they are not averse to comfortable chairs and the latest periodicals. It is for the convenience of these that the Diogenes Club was started, and it now contains the most unsociable and unclubable men in town. No member is permitted to take the least notice of any other one. Save in the Stranger's Room, no talking is, under any circumstances, allowed, and three offences, if brought to the notice of the committee, render the talker liable to expulsion."
- (Mycroft) "I hear of Sherlock everywhere since you became his chronicler."

Holmes' Fee

No fee is mentioned in the story, possibly due to Holmes doing a favor for his BIG brother.

Sherlock Holmes On The Big And The Little Screen

- 1922 The Greek Interpreter with Eille Norwood as one of his 47 movies.
- 1968 The Greek Interpreter with Peter Cushing as part of his Sherlock Holmes TV series
- 1980 The Master Blackmailer (combined with CHAS) with Vasily Livanov as an episode of the Russian Sherlock Holmes and Doctor Watson series
- 1985 *The Greek Interpreter* with Jeremy Brett in the BBC *Sherlock Holmes* 43 episode series **Newspapers**
- Daily News Morning Paper in London which was extremely liberal. Founded in1846.

Annotated Sherlock

- "atavism" the recurrence, in a descendant, of characteristics of a remote ancestor, instead of those of an immediate ancestor. Reversion to the primitive
- **"a sapper"** a member of a military engineer unit organized, trained, and equipped primarily for trenchdigging and other field fortification work
- "life-preserver" a short bludgeon, usually of flexible cane, whalebone, or the like,
- "ammunition boots" Official army boots issued to noncommissioned personnel
- "a J pen" A broad-pointed pen. Probably referred to the size of the nib, or, possible the shape of the point.

Weapons

- Blade (probably a knife) Which Sophy Kratides used to kill Harold Latimer and Wilson Kempt.
- Heavy Bludgeon With which Harold Latimer threatened Melas.
- **Stick** Which either Latimer or his cohort Wilson Kemp used to knock Melas unconscious, prior to the attempt to kill him by means of charcoal fumes.
- Charcoal Fumes (Carbon Dioxide) Which Harold Latimer used to kill Paul Kratides, and from Melas barely escaped death.
- Hands Of Harold Latimer and Wilson Kemp, which they used at various times on Melas, Paul Katrides, and Katrides' sister Sophy.
- **Kidnapping** Of Paul Katrides by Harold Latimer and Wilson Kemp, in order to get him to sign over his sister Sophy's fortune to Latimer.
- **First Kidnapping** Of Melas by Latimer and Kemp, to force him to act as interpreter between Katrides and them.
- Threat Made on Melas' life made by Latimer, and then later on Kemp.
- Second Kidnapping Of Melas, again to force him to act as interpreter, and also to get rid of him, as he had told Holes and the police about their activities.
- Threat Made on Katrides' life by Latimer and Kemp.
- Kidnapping (probable) Of Sophy Katrides by Latimer and Kemp, after they had murdered her brother.
- Torture and Starvation Done to Paul Kratides by Harold Latimer and Wilson Kemp.
