Buffelsspruit	Dry creek-bed near Pretoria, where Godfrey Emsworth was wounded during the

Cape Town	Seaport and capital city of the cape of Good Hope colony and the chief city of the

	the Boer War

Diamond Hill	One of a series of plateaus in the Transvaal, some twenty miles east of Pretoria;
	Godfrey Emsworth was wounded in the battle of Diamond Hill
Dodd, James M.	London stockbroker whose efforts to locate his war-time friend Godfrey Emsworth
	brought him to Holmes for assistance; Dodd had served with Emsworth in South
	Africa with the Imperial Yeomanry, Middlesex Corps,
Eastern Railway Line	In the Transvaal, the line of the Delagoa Bay and the East Africa railway, opened in
	1895, and running from Pretoria eastward to Delagoa Bay in East Africa; Godfrey
	Emsworth was wounded near the line in the battle of Diamond Hill
Emsworth, Colonel	Retired Army officer, living with his wife at Tuxbury Old Park in Bedfordshire; father of
	Godfrey Emsworth, who was believed to have contracted leprosy in South Africa
	Son of Colonel Emsworth, shot by an elephant gun during the Boer War; believed to
Emsworth, Godfrey	have contracted leprosy in South Africa was kept in seclusion by his parents; his
	friend, James Dodd, sought Holmes' assistance in finding Godfrey
	Railway station St. Pacras, London terminus of the London and North Western
Euston Station	railway; Holmes party entrained for Tuxbury Old Park at Euston

Imperial Yeomanry	Cavalry, organized in 1794; Among these troops was James Dodd and Godfrey

Kent, Dr.	Surgeon who was retained to look after Godfrey Emsworth, believing Godfrey had
	contracted leprosy; he was appreciative of the consultation by Sir James Saunders
Lancet	Independently published medical journal, begun in 1823; Homes wished to determine
	if Godfrey Emsworth's keeper was perhaps reading it

London	Largest city in the world during the Victorian period, capital of England and the British
	Empire, located in the south-eastern part of England on the River Thames; extended
	into the counties of Surrey, Ken, Middlesex, and Essex; Colonel Emsworth told James

Pretoria	City of the Transvaal, formerly the capital of the South African Republic; Godfrey

Priory School	Most select preparatory school in England, located near Mackleton in Hallamshire,
	from which Lord Saltire was abducted; Holmes referred to it as the Abbey School

Throgmorton Street	Busy financial street in the City, lying north of the Stock Exchange; James Dodd, friend
	of Godfrey Emsworth, had his office there
Tuxbury Old Park	Bedfordshire estate of Colonel Emsworth, and site of Tuxbury Old Hall
V.C.	Abbreviation for Victoria Cross, a military decoration founded by Queen Victoria in
	1856 and awarded for acts of conspicuous bravery in the face of the enemy; James
	Dodd called Old Colonel Emsworth "the Crimean V.C."
Victorian Architecture	Architectural style most prominent after the mid-19 th century; Tuxbury Old Hall
	possessed what James Dodd called a Victorian portico
Watson, John H.	Friend and biographer of Sherlock Holmes, it appears he was borne in the early 1850s;
	took his Degree of Doctor in Medicine in 1878; served as a staff surgeon at St.
	Bartholomew's Hospital; while serving in the Army Medical Department, he was
	severely wounded in the Battle of Maiwand in Afghanistan; his wound and general
	impairment of health earned him a retirement and wound pension
