- On behalf of the Fundraising Committee, Crystal Noll reported Donation Request letters and envelopes were distributed in the attendee packets at the various functions through the BSI weekend festivities. Crystal's Committee will be looking at some creative, unexplored fundraising campaigns in the coming year.
- On behalf of the Communications Committee, Steve
 Mason reports that the website is receiving over 1,000
 hits per week and that the addition of the Fortescue
 Scholarship program has been very popular. Steve also
 maintains the Society's Facebook page.
- Shannon Carlisle, our Junior Sherlockian Society Chair, reports their website is receiving over 4,000 hits per month.

Bursur (Treasurer) Dick Kitts reported a balance of \$23,337 in the Treasury at the date of our meeting. At the surface, that appears healthy.

However, this past year we only received donations from 23 individuals or organizations. The donations just barely covered the outlay for the Jan Stauber Grants.

Thankfully, and we are very grateful, some of the donations were very generous.

One of our most loyal and generous donors over the years, Al Gregory, was extremely disappointed at the poor showing of the number of donors.

With the increase in recognition and exposure of our Society thanks to the efforts of our Communications Committee, we can expect an increase in the number of Grant applications this coming year and in the future.

We cannot rely solely on the generosity of a few forever.
