• Fund-Raising

Donations for the year to date are \$13,161 from 45 donors compared to \$8,444 from 22 donors in 2017.

International Outreach

In late May, Jan Stauber Grant Chair Susan Diamond received an enquiry from a school administrator in Japan asking if the Beacon Society would accept grant applications from Japanese schools and teachers.



The Board of Directors voted in favor of the concept of accepting applications

from foreign countries (with stipulations), but our Bylaws were not clear if this practice would be permissible.

Just to be safe, the Board proceeded to pass a tentative By-law change to ensure compliance.

To be sure that this By-law change would not affect our Non-Profit status, the change was submitted to the Attorney General of Minnesota, where the Society registered for our Federal Non-Profit status.

Just recently, it was confirmed that our Non-Profit status remains valid even with the revised provision.

My thanks to Pj Doyle for following through with our correspondence with the Attorney General.

The revisions still need to be voted on by the Society's general membership to be valid.

I delayed issuing a newsletter until we received the Attorney General's confirmation.
